MTH 111 - Elementary Statistics (3SH)

- 1) The proposal for MTH 111 presents several inconsistencies and concerns that raise questions about its suitability as an Area III core math course. First, the prerequisite information is contradictory: the syllabus states a prerequisite of MTH 011 or an acceptable test score, while the course proposal form indicates "Prerequisite: None." This inconsistency reflects a lack of careful attention in the preparation of the materials. Moreover, the syllabus reveals that approximately half the semester is spent drawing bar charts, box plots, and Venn diagrams, while the remaining half attempts to cover statistical concepts that are addressed in greater depth in STAT 2510 at Auburn. However, unlike STAT 2510—which is not a core course but does require MATH 1100 or higher—MTH 111 requires no core-level math preparation, which suggests a significant gap in expected mathematical rigor and student readiness. While expertise in statistics may vary, it is clear that MTH 111 offers only a superficial treatment of statistical topics, and its low prerequisite standard places it below the level we maintain for our core courses. From Auburn's perspective, this course does not meet the academic standards we associate with a college-level core math option.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

3 credit hours. Non-calculus based introduction to statistics, statistical measures of data, statistical description of data, elementary probability, random variables, binomial and normal distributions, estimation, and hypothesis testing. This course has been designed for those students whose chosen field of study is a NON- STEM mathematical pathway. If the student's field of study changes to a STEM mathematical pathway, then additional mathematics course work may be required.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of the course, students are expected to be able to

- Develop quantitative skills necessary for analyzing and summarizing data
- Gain a working knowledge of descriptive statistical methods and their applications
- Understand probability and probability distributions, particularly the normal distribution
- Distinguish between descriptive and inferential statistics and understand the concept of hypothesis testing
- Define statistics, discuss data types, contrast qualitative and quantitative data, examine common applications of data analytical methods using real-world examples
- Develop procedures for listing and grouping quantitative data, both in tabular and graphical format.
- Present basic descriptive statistical measures of location (mean, median, mode) and variability (range, variance, standard deviation)
- Introduce the concept of probability and probability distributions, including the binomial and normal distributions
- Illustrate the concept of random samples and sampling distributions (of the mean) as a transition from descriptive to inferential statistics
- Distinguish between a sample and a population
- Calculate point (and confidence) interval estimates for a population mean using a large sample
- Present methods for hypothesis testing of a population mean using a large sample

- Present methods of hypothesis testing of differences between two population means
- Present methods for analyzing data from normal populations
- Describe (via calculation and graphs) statistical relationships between two variables

COURSE FORMAT

Students are expected to attend every class session and complete all homework assigned following each lecture. Students must have a university-authorized excuse in order to make up a test. All cell phones must be turned off during class time, and cell phones cannot be used as calculators. Students performing poorly on tests and quizzes are encouraged to visit my office during office hours for extra help. MTH 111 is a coordinated course. All sections will cover the same material and assignments.

COURSE OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, the student will demonstrate his or her abilities to think critically, communicate quantitative information, and apply mathematical concepts:

- <u>Critical Thinking</u>—Develop a logical, consistent plan to solve a problem, recognize consequences of the solution, and articulate a reason for choosing solution method
- <u>Communication Skills</u>—Use and present quantitative information in connection with an argument or problem solution and explicate it in an effective format
- <u>Empirical and Quantitative</u>—Construct and present a detailed problem statement with evidence of relevant contextual factors and possible approaches for solving the problem, then implement a solution and review the results.
