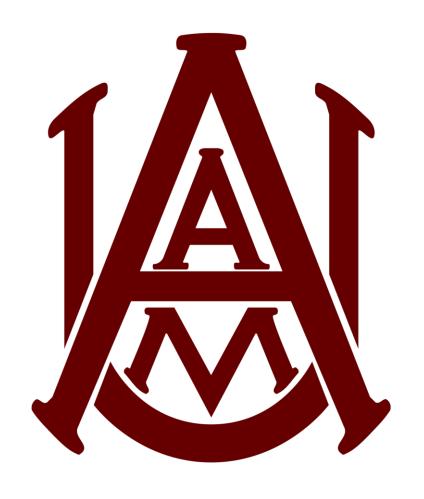


# AAMU Mathematics Pathways Task Force Report

National peer-reviewed research shows that traditional postsecondary mathematics courses serve as significant obstacles to student success and equity (Getz, Ortiz, Hartzler, & Leahy, 2016).



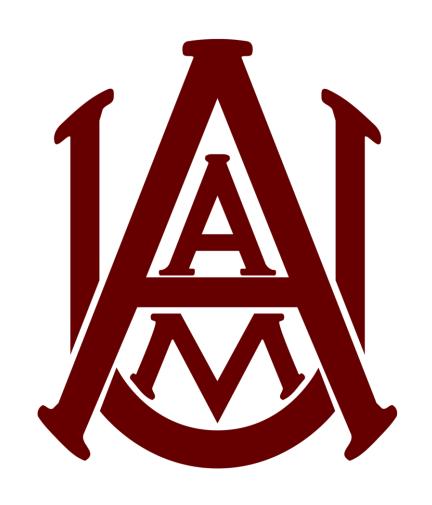
According to Gordon (2008), "Each year in colleges and universities across the United States, approximately 1,000,000 students enroll in college algebra; and each year approximately 50% of these students fail to pass this course with a grade of C or better" (as cited by Ganter & Haver, 2011, p. 49).



In a study by the John N. Gardner Institution for Excellence in **Undergraduate Education, researchers** examined DFW rates at 13 two-year and four-year institutions and found that 90 percent of students who were dismissed from the institution for academic reasons took College Algebra and received a D, F, withdrawal or incomplete in the course (Gardner, 2014).



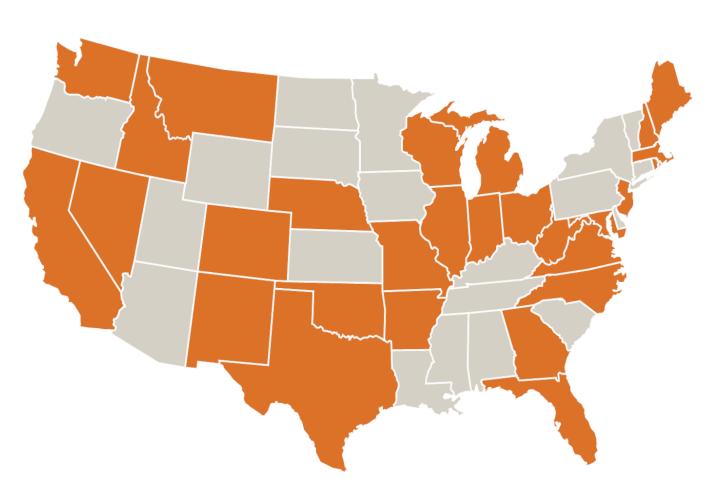
There is a need to impact student learning and success in mathematics across all disciplines, further supporting the need for pathways design.

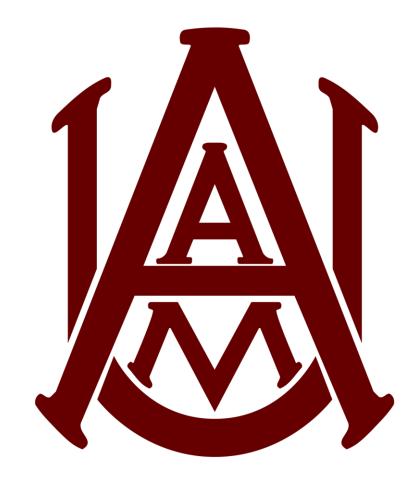

#### **STEM**

Pathway to start the students with an Algebra Based background in preparation for Calculus and its applications

#### Quantitative Reasoning

#### Key takeaways and timelines

- 1. 2 new courses (Quant Reasoning & Elem Stat I) and prerequisite to MTH 324 Elem Stat II were approved at the April ASCC
- 2. We requested that all academic programs identify a pathway that best served their needs.
- 3. We met with all Academic Advisors for Mathematics Pathways Briefing and Training in April 2024
- 4. Programs submitted Mod Forms for adopting the pathway and course(s) before the April ASCC Meeting to implement in Fall 2024.
- 5. We will launch the Mathematics Pathways Initiative in the Fall 2024.
- 6. We will collect and analyze Fall 2024 data of DFW rates in the core Mathematics courses and report compare and contrast findings by midsemester Spring 2025

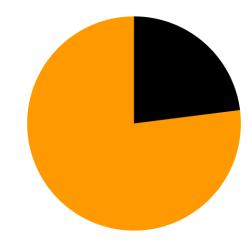

Only ~20% of majors require Calculus



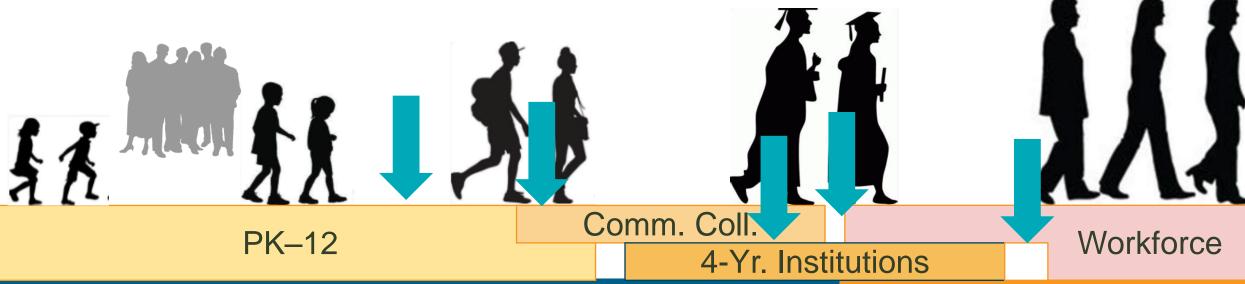

#### Critical transitions are key:

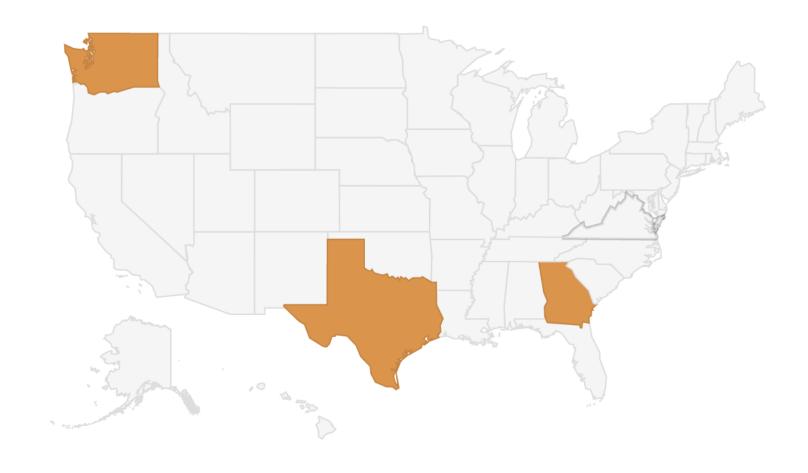
- Worse for minoritized students

#### Launch Years Initiative

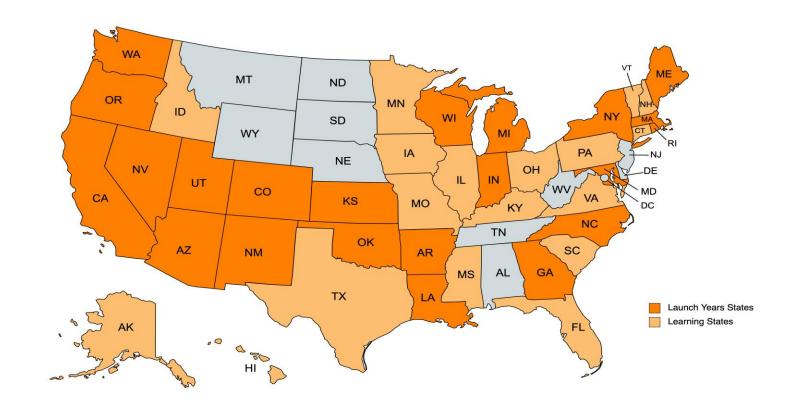
The Launch Years Initiative supports the scaling of mathematics pathways aligned to students' goals and aspirations, from high school through postsecondary education and into the workplace.

#### Launch Years Initiative — Phase 1 (2019—2022)

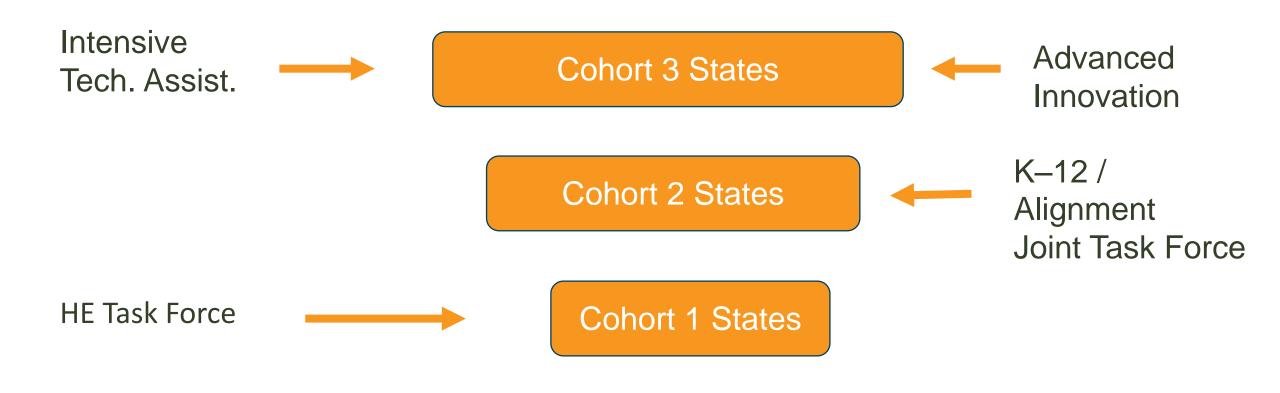


#### The Dana Centers Launch Years Initiative
