ASL 101 American Sign Language I

I. American Sign Language I Course—3 Semester Hours

II. Course Description

This course is an introduction to American Sign Language. Students will learn the basis of nonverbal communication skills as a foundation for learning American Sign Language. Upon course completion, students should be able to introduce themselves, exchange personal information, talk about one's family activities, give directions, and describe others utilizing sign language.

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- a. Introduce themselves
- b. Exchange personal information
- c. Talk about one's family activities
- d. Give Directions
- e. Describe others utilizing American Sign language
- f. Demonstrate a basic knowledge of the history and culture of the deaf community

VII. Evaluation and Assessment

Grades will be given based upon A = 90 - 100%, B = 80 - 89%, C = 70 - 79%, D = 60 - 69%, and F = below 60%.
