I. GLY 102 Introduction to Geology II (Historical Geology) —4 Semester Hours

II. Course Description

Historical geology is the study of Earth's history with a focus on the geological history of North America. Topics include geologic time, paleontology, , sea-floor spreading and continental drift, and mountain building. Labs include studies of fossils, paleogeography and geological maps and cross-sections.

V. Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. apply the scientific method in theory and laboratory.
- 2. apply content to solve geological problems.
- 3. interpret and analyze geologic data, maps, and cross-sections.
- 4. identify specimens of fossils and distinguish their characteristics.
- 5. determine relative and/or absolute age of rock units
- 6. describe the geologic time scale and apply it to Earth's history.

VII. Evaluation and Assessment
