I. HIS 201 United States History I – 3 Semester Hours

II. Course Description

This course surveys United States history from the pre-Columbian period to the Civil War era.

V. Course Objectives

By the end of the course, students will be able to

- 1. evaluate primary and secondary historical sources;
- 2. analyze patterns of historical continuity and change over time;
- 3. use components of historical thinking to identify various historical arguments;
- 4. identify and summarize the contributions of various individuals in American history up to the Civil War era; and
- 5. summarize various political, social, cultural, and economic events in American history up to the Civil War era and categorize them within a chronological framework.
