COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of the history, methodology, problems, and theory of archaeology including an outline of cultural development in both the New and Old Worlds. The course focuses on the techniques, theories, and knowledge that archaeologists use to understand the human past.

COURSE OBJECTIVES AND STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the course, you will:

- Describe the early history and development of the field of archaeology;
- Understand various field and laboratory techniques employed by modern archaeologists;
- Understand the methods by which archaeological materials are assigned to specific dates and date ranges in the past;
- Describe the legal and ethical obligations of archaeological practice;
- Understand the importance of archaeology and heritage in the modern world, including northeastern Alabama;

- Demonstrate a basic understanding of archaeological theory;
- List the possible career trajectories for people with archaeological training;
- Understand deep time.

Textbooks

<u>Required Text:</u> *Introducing Archaeology* (3rd Edition, 2021) by Muckle & Camp, University of Toronto Press. Chapter guides and resources are available at www.introducingarchaeology.com.

The book is available at the campus bookstore or your bookseller of choice for \$60 or less, and is also available to rent as an e-book. ASSIGNMENTS

We will have in-class activities during the second half of class on many Thursdays through the semester.

- I accept assignments handed to me before or after class or during office hours, placed in my department mailbox, by email, or via Canvas.

Grading and Late Policy for Homework:

- Each assignment will be worth 10 points. Specific grading rubrics will vary.

 office hours or by appointment, at which time we will discuss your new deadline.

EXAMS

There will be three exams during the semester: two mid-terms and a final. Each exam is worth 100 points and 20% of your grade. The exams will not be cumulative, but some questions may ask you to apply concepts from earlier sections of the course. Questions will cover in-class lectures and videos, activities, supplemental readings posted to Canvas, and the textbook. The last class prior to each exam will consist of an exam review. Our scheduled final exam is April 28 at 10AM.

<u>During exams, all materials except for pens/pencils and the exam booklet must be</u> <u>stowed in a bag and off of your desk.</u> Crib sheets (1 side of a sheet of 8x11" or A4 notebook or printer paper, handwritten) may be permitted at the instructor's discretion.

- If you must be absent on the day of an exam, please give me as much advance notice as possible and we will arrange for you to make up the exam.
